Mayor's Update

Dear Residents & Business Owners:

Welcome to summer and congratulations to all of you who will be celebrating Fathers' Day. Also, congratulations to all of our residents who will be graduating from high school this month.

The Borough Council introduced our 2009 municipal budget at its April 20 council meeting. A public hearing was held on this budget at our May 18 council meeting with final adoption coming after the state reviews the budgets and approves its passage.

Municipal taxes for 2009 on an average assessed home valued at \$875,424.00 will be .318 cents per \$100 of assessed value or \$2,783.35. This compares to municipal taxes for 2008 on the same home which was at .304 cents per \$100 of assessed value or \$2,661.29. The total increase was .014 cents or \$122.06. The amount of this year's budget is \$5,093,042 versus last year's amount of \$4,861,626. The increase was \$231,416 over the 2008 budget.

As is typically the case, line items for Fixed Costs were up significantly. Some of these increases included pensions (\$50,286), hospitalization (\$22,000), and gasoline (\$13,500). We elected not to defer our pension payments to the state as some municipalities chose to do. The council and the administration did not want to defer this to next year and risk putting us in a "financial black hole" by doing so.

Given the financial climate this year, the council (including Councilman Andrus and his finance committee), Ellen Sandman and Sue Giordano were able to deliver a fair and appropriate municipal budget. A copy of the budget is available in the Phoenix House to review.

As you may have noticed, work has begun on the renovation of the Phoenix House Garden. Also, the Shade Tree Commission, lead by Dave Sharkey, has begun to plant new trees around town. A special thanks goes out to Dave and Chris Nicholson who planted crab apple trees adjacent to the JCP&L sub-station on East Main Street. As these trees mature, they will provide a natural buffer between the sub-station

and Main Street.

Councilman Garubo reports that plans are on track for another successful summer camp program and that the recent fishing derby, sponsored by the Mendham Borough and Mendham Township Police Departments, was enjoyed by all.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our neighboring police departments who provided police coverage to Mendham Borough while all members of our police department attended the wake and funeral of our good friend, Sgt. Rich Morales. Sgt. Morales insured our safety for 22 years and we will all remember him for his many positive contributions to Mendham Borough.

On behalf of the Borough Council and all of our employees, I would like to wish all of you a safe and relaxing summer.

Be Bear Aware

Black bears are venturing too close to homes and into backyards, looking for food. When that happens, the bears must be destroyed to protect your family and your neighbors. What's more, it's illegal to feed bears in New Jersey. Anyone who feeds bears could face a penalty of up to \$1,000 for each offense. Taking steps to avoid attracting bears with food or garbage is the best way to prevent them from becoming a nuisance near your home.

- Use bear-proof garbage containers.
- Put out garbage on collection day, not before.
- Wash garbage containers with disinfectant solution.
- Feed dogs and cats outside during daylight hours only. Immediately after feeding pets, remove all uneaten food and scraps as well as food bowls.
- Clean outdoor grills thoroughly after each use.
- Do not place meat or sweet foods in compost piles.

Solutions for Stormwater Pollution

Easy Things You Can Do
Everyday to Protect Our Water

A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: you name it, and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it. By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.

As a resident, business, or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides

- Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions.
- Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.
- Look into alternatives for pesticides.
- Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer.
- If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to apply it correctly.

Properly use and dispose of hazardous products

- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze and paints.
- Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local water bodies, and the water is not treated.
- If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.
- Use natural or less toxic alternatives.
- Recycle used motor oil.
- Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous-waste disposal facilities.



Keep pollution out of storm drains

- Municipalities and other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets reminding people that storm drains are connected to local water bodies.
- Do not let sewage or other wastes flow into a stormwater system.



Clean up after your pet

- Many municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet-waste rules.
- An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.
- Make sure you know your town's or agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law. And remember to:
 - Use newspaper, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes;
 - Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash or unwrapped in a toilet; and
 - Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.



Don't feed wildlife

- Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.
- Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.

Don't litter



- Place litter in trash receptacles.
- Recycle. Recycle. Recycle.
- Participate in community cleanups.

Dispose of yard waste properly

- Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.
- If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them.
- Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost.
- Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.

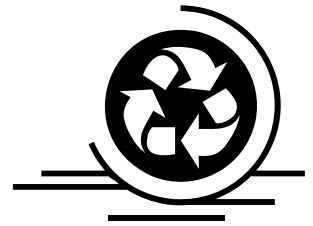
