Mayor's Update

Dear Resident and Business Owner:

By now, most of you are aware that the Mayor and Borough Council approved a resolution at our June 3 meeting to enter into an agreement with the Borough of Chester to use their court. This agreement will go into effect on January 1, 2014, which means our long-term relationship with Mendham Township as partners in a shared court agreement will come to an end. The new agreement was approved by Superior Court Judge Thomas L. Weisenbeck in Morristown.

As mentioned quite often in this column, our goal is to reduce taxes wherever possible without cutting back on any service to the taxpayer. I believe that goal has been achieved as it relates to this issue.

The Mayor and Council typically review various departments on a rotating basis to make sure the Borough is getting its "biggest bang for the buck." In the beginning of 2012, an analysis was done by members of the Mendham Borough administration which concluded that the Borough was losing approximately \$45,000 each year due to the 50-50 cost arrangement which they presently have with the Township of Mendham to share its court.

The recommendation from our chief financial officer was that the cost structure involving the court worked against us and that it needed to be fixed. We believed the best course of action was to ask Mendham Township officials to propose a new, more equitable arrangement while also exploring other potential shared court arrangements with neighboring municipalities. This led us to Chester Borough Mayor Bob Davis and the Chester Borough Council. We had been made aware that Chester Borough was seeking a court partner while discussions were being held on the regional high school funding formula.

Mendham Borough officials wanted bottom line proposals from both Mendham Township and Chester Borough. While both proposals were competitive, the Borough Council and I decided to enter into an agreement with Chester Borough based on economics (Mendham Borough will go from losing approximately \$45,000 to making approximately \$45,000 in the first

year of the contract) as well as the similarities in the case loads the two boroughs were handling.

While this means an end to a longtime agreement with Mendham Township, I don't want to stop working with Mendham Township officials to continue to explore all shared service opportunities with them, and all other neighboring communities. There are absolutely no hard feelings on the Borough's part towards the township; this was strictly a business decision that was made in the best interests of our taxpayer. Mayor Merkt received our decision graciously and with respect while vowing to continue to work with us to assess potential shared service arrangements.

On a closing note, the Mayor and Council have invited Sister Joan Daniel, Mother Superior of the Sisters of Christian Charity, to serve as our Grand Marshall in our 2013 Labor Day parade. We would like to recognize her for the warm welcome during Superstorm Sandy when she opened the doors to her home to help all of us in the Borough. Congratulations Sister Joan!

The library has been conducting a survey and here are some of the early results.

Library FAQs

65% of patrons visit the library once a week or more.

Our library is used primarily for the following resources:

- ◆ 90% of patrons borrow books.
- ◆ 63% of patrons frequently borrow fiction, while 38% borrow non-fiction.
- ◆ 78% of patrons borrow movies.
- ◆ 42% of patrons borrow magazines or read newspapers.
- ◆ 75% of patrons borrow materials from other libraries using the Interlibrary Loan system or ILL.
- ◆ Only 6% of patrons use the library's ebook lending system called Overdrive.

Some patrons would like the following improvements:

- ◆ Add more comfortable seating areas.
- ◆ Improve accessibility to best-sellers.

Other interesting suggestions and comments include:

- ◆ More coordination and visits with Hilltop and Mountain View Schools.
- ◆ More pre-school activities.
- ◆ Create a film club of classic or foreign films.
- ◆ Send more emails to keep patrons better informed.

Thank you for all the feedback and ideas. We are working to address your suggestions, and will let you know in future editions of the Messenger when we add new programs or make changes. In the meantime, keep the comments coming!

Solutions for Stormwater Pollution

**Easy Things You Can Do
Everyday to Protect Our Water**

A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: you name it, and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it. By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.

As a resident, business, or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides

- Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions.
- Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.
- Look into alternatives for pesticides.
- Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer.
- If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to apply it correctly.

Properly use and dispose of hazardous products

- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze and paints.
- Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local water bodies, and the water is not treated.
- If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.
- Use natural or less toxic alternatives.
- Recycle used motor oil.
- Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous-waste disposal facilities.



Keep pollution out of storm drains

- Municipalities and other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets reminding people that storm drains are connected to local water bodies.
- Do not let sewage or other wastes flow into a stormwater system.



Clean up after your pet

- Many municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet-waste rules.
- An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.
- Make sure you know your town's or agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law.



And remember to:

- Use newspaper, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes;
- Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash or unwrapped in a toilet; and
- Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.

Don't feed wildlife

- Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.
- Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.

Don't litter

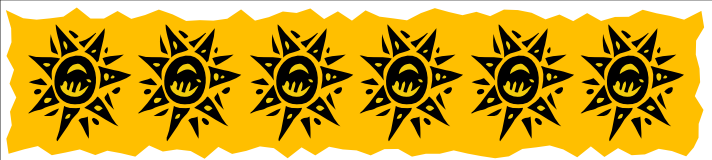
- Place litter in trash receptacles.
- Recycle. Recycle. Recycle.
- Participate in community cleanups.

Dispose of yard waste properly

- Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.
- If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them.
- Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost.
- Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.
