Welcome back! I hope you all had a relaxing and fulfilling summer and that the new school year is off to a great start.

#### Summer Wrap-up:

In case you were away all summer and missed our town activity, our team was engaged in taking care of business and keeping Mendham Borough looking its finest.

Jeff Cooper and our DPW team brought us 19 new benches throughout our parks. They finished up the landscaping of our new tennis courts, which have been getting a lot of use. They also did a great job in working with the contractor who paved 7 roads through our capital budget and Dean Road via a Local Aid Grant.

Joyce Bushman and Lisa Smith have overseen a continued revamping of our <a href="www.Mendhamnj.org">www.Mendhamnj.org</a> website. If you haven't visited in a while, log on and take a tour around. They have streamlined and organized our site to make it more user-friendly and easier to find what you need to do business with the town.

Thanks to Bruce DiBisceglie and the Recreation Department, we had the return of all of our summer recreation activities. Summer camp was sold out every week, and outdoor movies, our band series, and the Labor Day parade returned.

Also, a special thanks to Nathalie Masse and Melissa Wojcik who volunteered and ran our first ever "Yoga in the Park" program. When I first spoke with our resident yoga instructors I asked if they would step up and run four sessions. Due to the heat we had to cancel our first sessions, but they carried on and were so pleased with the turn-out of residents coming out to stretch and downward dog with them that they extended our program and continued all summer. Keep an eye on our announcements as we are working towards offering indoor yoga this fall. Thank you both, Nathalie and Melissa!

Finally, applauds are due for Chief Camoia and our PD team for the orchestration of our elaborate road detours during the New Jersey American Water and Morris County pipe replacement project. It was a challenge for all who had to drive the detours, but especially for having to design and continually adjust to the changing construction needs. These major infrastructure projects are not fun, but critical for the maintenance and improvement of our services. Our team will continue to work with the county as this project is completed likely next spring and the area of replacement on Main Street is repaved. We will be certain to be posting notices on Nixle.

We are always working to maintain and highlight Mendham Borough's historic character. Our latest additions to these efforts include a new About Mendham & History page at the bottom left of our home page. This is just the beginning of more additions to our website. 

# Volunteer Day @Schiff

## September 25, 2021 (Saturday) 9-11 am

Please join Schiff for a day of land stewardship activities at 339 Pleasant Valley Road. Each Volunteer Day provides the community an opportunity to work side by side with Schiff staff and Board members in a variety of hands-on projects. Depending on the season, we may be removing brush and vines from trails, removing invasive species, conducting building repairs, restoring fences and bridges, or raking out the Native Garden. Volunteers (16 and under with a parent, please) are encouraged to dress in weather appropriate attire, wear hard toe shoes, bring sunscreen and bug spray, and bring a beverage and snack in a backpack for hands free walking. Fully vaccinated volunteers are asked to have a mask on hand for when social distancing is not possible. Unvaccinated volunteers are to wear masks. Please bring your own gloves. Tools owned and provided by Schiff will be cleaned before and after use and should not be shared that day between volunteers. Volunteers may bring and use their own tools if they prefer.

#### Be Bear Safe

"Black bear sightings and incidents across the state, in general, have declined for the past few years, especially as we reduce the number of bears overall and people



better understand how to coexist with them," said Dave Chanda, director of the State Division of Fish and Wildlife. "However, in some areas of the state where bears have been far less common, residents may be alarmed to encounter bears. We urge people to be cautious when encountering bears, but there is no need for alarm."

You can reduce the risk of interactions with bears by taking a few simple steps. Most important, do not feed bears, intentionally or unintentionally. Bears that learn to associate food with people, their homes and living areas and can become nuisance bears that forage in neighborhoods looking for easy sources of food. It is illegal to intentionally feed black bears in New Jersey and punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000. But a more common problem is unintentional bear feeding by homeowners. Secure your trash and eliminate obvious sources of food, such as pet food on decks, easy-to-reach bird feeders, or food residues left in barbecue grills. In areas regularly frequented by bears, livestock and beehives should be protected with properly installed electric fences.

#### The following tips can help:

- Use certified bear-resistant garbage containers if possible and wash garbage containers frequently with a disinfectant solution to remove odors. Put out garbage on collection day, not the night before.
- Avoid feeding birds when bears are active.
- Immediately remove all uneaten food and food bowls used by pets fed outdoors.
- Clean outdoor grills and utensils to remove food and grease residue. Store grills securely.
- Do not place meat or any sweet foods in composts.
- Remove fruit/nuts that fall from trees in your yard.
- Properly installed electric fencing is an effective way of protecting crops, beehives and livestock.
- If you encounter a bear, remain calm and do not run. Make sure the bear has an escape route.
   Avoid direct eye contact, back up slowly and speak with a low, assertive voice.

## Deer Management Program

The Mendham Borough Police Department will again be overseeing the Deer Management Program for the 2021-22 season. This will start in September and end in February. This program helps reduce potentially dangerous motor vehicle crashes that involve deer, and it also helps to prevent the damage that deer cause to the surrounding landscape and agriculture. Archery hunters will be stationed in some Municipal Parks and also on participating private properties throughout the Borough. Most hunting will take place during dusk and dawn. # From the Green Corner: Draining your pool, chlorine can kill aquatic and wildlife

For homeowners who have an in-ground or above-ground pool, here are some eco-friendly guidelines.

- ♦ De-chlorinate by allowing the water to stand for 7-10 days
- Drain the water directly onto the grass of your yard.
- Drain the pool slowly to allow it to be absorbed into the ground and to prevent erosion and ponding.
- Maintenance discharges from swimming pools such as filter backwash and acid wash should not be discharged into the storm water sewers

#### Did you know?

- High levels of chlorine in pool water can kill wildlife, fish, crayfish and other aquatic animals.
- ♦ Salt water swimming pools use salt to make chlorine. The resulting chloride can also harm or kill wildlife.
- ◆ Stormwater drainage systems go directly into our streams and ponds. Let's reduce erosion and pollution; follow the guidelines and Mother Earth will be happy!

# Join the Battle, Beat the Bug! Stomp out the Spotted Lanternfly!

Spotted Lanternfly (SLF) is a serious invasive pest with a healthy appetite for our plants and it can be a significant nuisance, affecting the quality of life and enjoyment of the outdoors. The spotted lanternfly uses its piercing-sucking mouthpart to feed on sap from over 70 different plant species. It has a strong preference for economically important plants and the feeding damage significantly stresses the plants which can lead to decreased health and potentially death.

As SLF feeds, the insect excretes honeydew (a sugary substance) which can attract bees, wasps, and other insects. The honeydew also builds up and promotes the growth for sooty mold (fungi), which can cover the plant, forest understories, patio furniture, cars, and anything else found below SLF feeding.
